

## **How to make an Origami Pelican**

#### The Problem:


-The GSL is critical for American White Pelicans.

- -The population of American White Pelicans on Gunnison Island has drastically decreased from a high of 20,000 to nearly zero in 2022 because it is no longer an island and predators/humans are now frequent visitors.
- -With the Great Salt Lake water levels going down the marshes, freshwater lakes, and wetlands are also losing water, so the fish the Pelicans eat are disappearing.

### Feeding:

- -They eat fish, crayfish, salamanders, tadpoles, and turtles.
- -Their beak drains out water when they catch a fish.
- -They can hold up to 3 gallons of water in their beak.







#### Flight:

- -During migration they fly up to 1017.3 miles.
- -In March they arrive in Utah and leave in late fall.
- -They can fly 30 mph and up to 100 miles per day.
- -Pelicans fly in an upward spiral to gain elevation and can go as high as a commercial airplane.

#### Family Units & Eggs:

- -Mating happens through late March to early May.
- -Pairs used to nest on Gunnison Island in the GSL.
- -The American White Pelicans usually lay 2 eggs and only one baby survives per pair.

#### **Baby American White Pelicans:**

-Pelicans must fly up to 60 miles to catch food that they regurgitate to feed their young.
